Adjective Phrase:

- Compare:
 - 1. He is a *wealthy* man
 - 2. He is a **man** of wealth
 - Def:

An Adjective Phrase is a phrase (or group of words) that does the work of an Adjective.

- Further Examples:
 - That was a **cowardly act**. (Adjective)
 - That was an act of cowardice. ... (Adj. Phrase)

- Brutus is an **honourable man**. (Adjective)
- Brutus is a man of honour.(Adj. Phrase)
- He is **well**.(Adjective)
- He is in good health. (Adjective Phrase)



Definition:

- Phrase is a <u>group of words</u> that makes sense, but only partly.
- It is a *part of sentence*, but does not have finite verb
- *Eg:* blue dress; wealthy merchant

Adjective Phrase

- A group of words that does the function of an adjective in a sentence is called an adjective phrase.
- The <u>dazzling beautiful</u> girl walked down the street.
 - It is more than a group of words with an adjective in it.
 - It is actually a group of words that <u>describe</u> <u>a noun/pronoun</u> in a sentence thus function as an adjective.

- Sometimes *one adjective* isn't descriptive enough.
- In such case string of adjective can work together as an adjective phrase to describe a noun as:
 - i. She ate a <u>tasty</u>, <u>healthy</u>, <u>and nitrious</u> sandwich.
 - ii. The day was hot and sunny.
 - iii. She had the most <u>silky, smooth, and</u> <u>radiant</u> hair I have ever seen.

- i. Mary is a <u>sweet girl</u>.(one adj)
- ii. Mary is a <u>sweet</u>, intelligent and beautiful girl.
- He asked <u>fairly an intelligent question</u>.

So we see an adjectival phrase that paints a much more in-depth picture of Mary

- i. The <u>beautiful</u> house sits atop the hill.
- ii. The house that is so beautiful sits atop the hill.
- iii. The <u>angry</u> dog barks all day long.
- iv. The dog that seems very angry barks all day long.

- Some adjective phrases modify noun or noun phrases.
 - 1. Something in the corner was moving
 - 2. The big bug <u>under the blanket</u> is coming towards me.

 Other adjective phrases <u>modify the</u> predicate of the sentence:

- i. We were <u>saddened</u> by the news of his demise
- ii. I was <u>delighted</u> he was chosen for the party
- iii. The brownies <u>smell deliciously sweet</u>.

- Adjective phrase can also Modify
 Objects and will follow the word they are modifying:
 - i. She wanted to paint her room <u>lemony</u> <u>yellow</u>
 - ii. My new kitten makes me very happy.
 - iii. We are collecting money for children born with heart defects.
 - iv. They are proud of the team that <u>made it</u> <u>to the final</u>

- Some adjective phrase comes at the **Beginning** of the sentences:
 - i. Your overly exited friend is dancing.
 - ii. <u>Betrayed by his girl friend</u> Charles committed suicide.
- Some comes at the **Middle** of the sentences
 - i. A guy <u>smarter than me</u> will solve this puzzle.
 - ii. The girl wearing the red t-shirt lives next to my house.

- Some Adj phrases comes at the <u>End</u> of the sentences:
 - i. His behaviour was highly rude.
 - ii. The last question was <u>very difficult to</u> <u>solve</u>.
- Sometimes an adjective phrase <u>does not</u> <u>have an adjective</u> in it. It starts with following
 - i. A Preposition.
 - ii. A Participles.
 - iii. An Infinitives

1. Starts with Preposition:

- i. I don't like the movies with no stories
- ii. I have a picture of your childhood.

2. Starts with Participles

What is participle?

Def: A participle is a word that is formed from verb which works as an adjective :

Ex: <u>Burning</u> house <u>Broken</u> window

- i. The guy <u>sleeping on the floor</u> is my friend.
 ii. The shop <u>built next to my house</u> is quite huge.
- 3. Begins with Infinitive
 - i. I don't know a person to trust blindly.
 - ii. He is a guy to look out for in the next match

≻ Note:

When an *adjective phrase* does not have an adjective in it, we generally call it an **Adjectival Phrase**
